

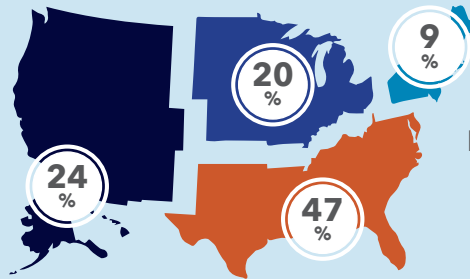
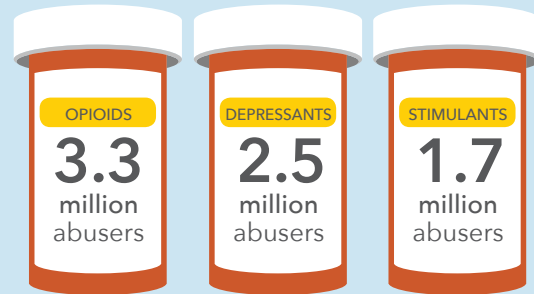

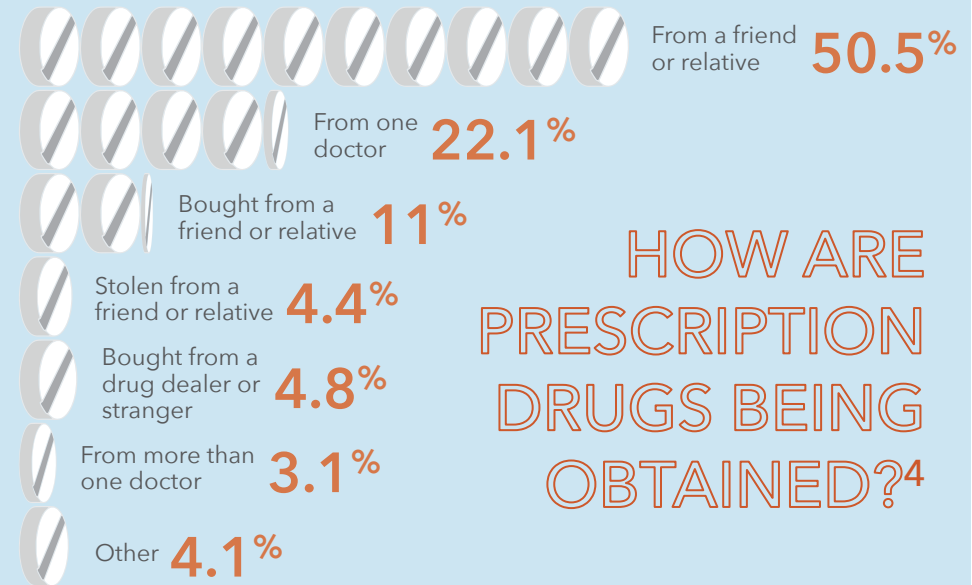
Each year, prescription drug overdoses kill more than 17,000 Americans¹ and result in 1.4 million ER visits².

FRAUD INDICATORS:

- Number of doctor visits
- Distance traveled to physician or pharmacy
- Frequency of prescriptions
- Geography and patient population

OUR SOLUTION:

- Use of a real-time audit system
- Clinical and utilization management programs
- Compliance with all government requirements
- Physician reporting programs
